



### **HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2022**

The Carlsbad Coalition has had great opportunities to partner with other agencies and organizations over this past year and also to participate in many events around our great city. The Coalition has developed new initiatives, campaigns, and partnerships and we would like to highlight those for you all.

The Coalition works on several grants, The Office of Substance Abuse Prevention which focuses on the development and enforcement of alcohol and underage drinking laws, education about safe storage and disposal of prescription medication, implementing a new safe storage awareness campaign for cannabis, as well as working with the schools to provide direct service programming. The New Mexico Community Survey was conducted, and Eddy County's 2022 results showed that Perceived risk of harm associated with misusing painkillers remains high and has increased in the past year. There was an increase of people reporting locking up their prescription painkillers. There was also a slight decrease for current drinking and binge drinking. Decrease also occurred for adults and parents providing alcohol to minors along with a slight increase for the belief that drinking hurts the community financially. We have given out 26 cabinet locks to cannabis distributers to hand out to their customers as well as other community members. This grant also focuses on providing merchant education with tobacco retailers across two counties regarding updated tobacco laws.

We are thankful to **Esther Hernandez and Hannah Ornelas** for all their efforts on these initiatives.

The Coalition works on five different grants that provide drug and alcohol prevention programming to  $6^{th}$  and  $8^{th}$  graders at the Carlsbad and Loving Schools.

The Coalition provides the All-Star's curriculum, which is an evidence-based prevention program, to students at these schools.

- The **STOP** (Carlsbad Youth Sober Truth program) graduated 221 youth from Alta Vista's 6<sup>th</sup> grade class.
- The Strategic Prevention Framework program graduated 151 youth from CIS and 23 youth from Loving 8<sup>th</sup> grade class.
- The **OSAP program** started direct services this fall and graduated 107 youth from Alta Vista 8<sup>th</sup> grade class.

The TOP program graduated 14 youth from Jefferson Montessori Academy in the spring and currently has 18 youth enrolled this fall at the Loving High School. These two programs encourage service-learning projects to be done in the community. This year they were able to provide holiday cards to elderly for encouragement through the San Jose Senior Citizens Center for people homebound through Meals on Wheels, filled candy bags for the Carlsbad Police Department Trunk or Treat, created sidewalk art and positivity posters around the school, worked on Red Ribbon week initiatives such as presentations, posters, dress-up, video campaigns, National Public Lands Trash Pick-up Day, and currently working on One-Step Ahead which is creating hygiene stations in the school bathrooms and providing for youth who need it and also working with Keep Carlsbad Beautiful at Guevara Memorial Park in Loving doing trash pick-up. Thank you to JMA, Kelli Barta and Kerrie Thatcher for allowing us into the classroom, along with Raeleen Reed from Loving Middle School and Victoria Patton from Loving High School. We are also thankful to Julie Fuentes,

Tiffany Shirley, Samantha Smith, Esther Hernandez and Hannah Ornelas who worked on these programs throughout the year.

Julie, Samantha, and Esther also worked together to provide services to youth through Teen Court of Eddy County. This is an alternative sentencing program for youth with misdemeanor offenses. They have had 73 youth who have gone through the program this year with 636 hours of service learning completed. Teen Court also granted one Senior, Tessa Folsom, with the Officer Dwayne Mounce Appreciation Scholarship. We are thankful for our adult volunteers, Megan Bowen, Mark Horton, Nate Banks, Teri Young as well as our youth volunteers Leah Horton, Alison Ackland, Anabelle Wells, Hanli Norman, Dhruvi Patel, Lilv Moho, and Gemma McCormick. A big thank you to Officer Michael Shott for working with these youth as a bailiff and substance prevention educator and David Bradley with Brandley's School of Driving for providing defensive driving classes for the youth. We have grown drastically in case load this semester. We are starting to see increases in school referrals for drug issues. We are working diligently with Carlsbad High School as well as the middle and high Loving regarding school referrals. continuously seek youth attorneys as well as volunteer judges. We are seeking to expand to extra nights due to our increase in case load. We have partnered with the Carlsbad Police Department, special thank you to Sgt. Andy Carver, for receiving state approval to teach our defensive driving classes. Thank you also to Cpl. Tony Baca for teaching the drug prevention awareness class.

This year we have directly empowered 607 youth through these programs with life skills, conflict resolution tools, and plans for their future.

- Provided a demonstration of youth rooms with stash compartments for parental awareness.
